Our rehearsals focus on bringing the magic of radio to life. The days are mostly spent figuring out how make


live sound effects — we were delighted to discover that rubber gloves make the sound of a raven's wings in flight; an eggbeater replicates a shopping cart in motion; and if you squeeze a bag of cornstarch just right, it sounds like trudging through freshly fallen snow.

As I write this, the company is gathered around the piano — we're working through the harmonies of "We Three Kings of Orient Are." Designers, Kenilee and Devon, are working with the crew to transform the Artesian into a winter snow globe.

There are so many elements crafted and composed by multiple teams of theatre makers. Its been a delight to bring them all together to make this the most original production. My respect and admiration goes to the writers of these timeless tales for inspiring us all to conjure our own particular holiday spirit.



Jennifer Brewin | Director

Jennifer Brewin joined Regina's Globe Theatre as it's 5th Artistic Director in 2020. Prior to the move to Saskatchewan, she was the Co-Artistic Director of Toronto's Common Boots Theatre, Artistic Associate at the National Arts Centre, and Co-Artistic Director of B.C.'s Carayan Farm Theatre.

She is a director, playwright, and producer specialising in new works. She has staged large-scale works for outdoor stages across the country and overseas, including Ottawa's Experimental Farm, the Canadian war memorial in Vimy, France, numerous productions on Caravan's 80 acre farm in B.C's Okanagan Valley, as well as six outdoor winter walking shows in Toronto at Evergreen Brick Works and Christie Pits Park. Most recently was part of an international collaboration with the Little Amal team as part of the 2023 Luminato Festival. She has directed premiers of new plays by Marjorie Chan, George F. Walker, Natasha Greenblatt, Martha Ross, Michelle Riml, and Haley McGee as well as the classics including Cymbeline for Shakespeare on the Saskatchewan. As a writer she co-authored several collective creations including, The Election, The Public Servant, The Attic, and The Pearls and 3 Fine Girls, all for Common Boots

She is the recipient of a Dora Mavor Moore Award, a Jessie Award, and The Armstrong Award of Excellence (with Estelle Shook).

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Mackenzy Vida | Headpiece Designer

Mackenzy Vida (she/her) is a multidisciplinary artist from Treaty 4, Regina, Saskatchewan. Art therapy in early childhood was the catalyst that lit her passion for the arts. Globe Theatre School fostered confidence in exploring her creativity. Her introduction to theatre design featured shows from the Sandbox Series;

Concord Floral | Young Company Directed by Judy Wensel (2019); and In Care Directed by Kenneth T. Williams (2019).

The inspiration for the headpieces comes from the patchwork look of handmade items. The colours hark to the environment in which the animals dwell. When creating the works with the help of Celeste Pinder, we utilized scraps of fabric to play with texture and give the fur dimension. Pairing this with dyed burlap keeps them grounded in the natural world with a hint of whimsy.

Thomas King | Author of Coyote's New Suit

Thomas King is an award-winning writer and photographer. His critically acclaimed, bestselling books include Medicine River; Green Grass, Running Water; One Good Story, That One; Truth and Bright Water; A Short History of Indians in Canada; The Back of the Turtle (winner of the Governor General's Literary Award for Fiction); The Inconvenient Indian (winner of the RBC Taylor

Prize); the DreadfulWater mystery series; Indians on Vacation; Sufferance; the poetry collection 77 Fragments of a Familiar Ruin; and Borders, a graphic novel adaptation of one of his most celebrated short stories. A Companion of the Order of Canada and the recipient of a National Aboriginal Achievement Award, Thomas King lives in Guelph, Ontario.



W.O. Mitchell | Author of Frankincents an' Meer

Globe Theatre: Author/playwright of The Black Bonspiel of Wullie MacCrimmon, Jake and the Kid, The Kite, Back to Beulah

Over his sixty-year writing career W.O. Mitchell wrote short stories, novels, magazine articles, radio and television plays, stage plays (including a musical), and film scripts. His work won numerous awards, including two Stephen Leacock awards,

the Chalmers Canadian Play Award, and three ACTRA awards. Through his reading performances, he became known as Canada's Mark Twain. Perhaps no other Canadian writer has been so versatile, not only in art form, but in audience appeal. He is best known for his "Jake and the Kid" stories, dramatized in CBC's radio series in the 1950s, and for Who Has Seen the Wind, a Canadian classic that has sold over three-quarters of a million copies in Canada alone and is taught in schools and universities across Canada.

Behind the Curtain

Carson Walliser - Costume Designer

The main mission with this show was to hold onto the charm of the first two iterations of Making Spirits Bright, and then bump up the colours, the textures, and the whimsy. After looking at images from It's a Wonderful Life, Miracle on 34th Street, White Christmas, Norman Rockwell Illustrations, and vintage Coca-Cola advertisements I felt like I kept coming back to words like: classic, cozy, and joyful. And so we used materials like velvet, satin, flannel, fur, gold, and lots and lots of knits to give the show that warm, holiday party feeling. The actor's all bring so much life to the show, and so it was important to me that the costumes made everyone feel beautiful and excited.

This year the show is bigger than before, with four stories, music, and merriment. Additionally we wanted each story to feel distinctly different so we gave each one it's own visual style. The whole evening lives in the world of a 1940's radio show being recorded in front of our eyes, and then each story builds off of that world.
